Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Very few people realize the influence that philosophy has on society. The average person likely thinks that such abstract ideas are only the concern of professionals, like university professors. But in fact, philosophy tends to gradually trickle down, eventually affecting the entire population. For example, Atheism and Agnosticism were once the ideologies of intellectuals; but since the beginning of the Enlightenment, such views have become very common.

One such system of ideas based

on Atheism is that of Nihilism: the belief that truth is subjective and life is meaningless. The most famous proponent of this philosophy was Friedrich Nietzsche (d. 1900). His ideas have slowly infiltrated society, leading to a massive rejection of objective morality. Because of the popular interpretation of Nihilism, many people believe that morals (and laws) should be based merely on human

desires or majority opinion, rather than on divinelyinspired truths about human nature and inter-personal relationships.

Another common philosophical view is that of Utilitarianism: the doctrine that an action is right insofar as it promotes happiness, and that the greatest happiness of the greatest number should be the guiding principle of conduct. In its popular form, utilitarianism is often taken to mean functionalism; in other words, assessing the value of something based on its practical function. With the spread of this idea, society has assumed the role of judging everything—and everyone—based on whether it (or she) is deemed useful. Religion is of little importance in such a scheme because it doesn't offer anything "useful" to society (or at

least not anything that couldn't be obtained elsewhere). A prime example of this is how many view prayer or worship. They consider it to be of minimal use, and therefore do not value it highly. Such sentiments can be seen in the way many people view pastors, devaluing their position because "all they do is pray."

Another set of ideas, not quite a philosophy but more of a worldview, is consumerism. Here the person is deemed useful in as much as she is a consumer. Society is defined as the production, marketing, and sale of goods; and only those persons

able to buy are valued. As in the other philosophies mentioned, the human person is thereby

diminished.

In response to all such temptations, St Paul warns us, "See to it that no one takes you captive by philosophy and empty deceit" (Col 2:8). We must be very careful to examine what we believe about ourselves, and about the world. As Orthodox Christians, we should look to Christ, and our Holy Tradition, to

define our views. In the eyes of God, each person is of inestimable worth. Based on this, we do not assess a person's value based on function or consumption. And based on this, we look to God's commandments, not our desires, to know how to relate to each other.

Society is full of competing ideologies. We do not need new ideas; we need timeless truths.
