Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

At the end of November, Americans celebrate a unique secular holiday. It began in 1621 when the Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Indians shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the colonies. For more than two centuries, days of thanksgiving were celebrated by individual colonies and states. But it wasn't until 1863, in the midst of the Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

During the years that St. Tikhon guided the Orthodox Church in America (then known the Russian Missionary Metropolia), he was impressed by the fact that the United States—although a pluralistic nation that practices separation of religion and governmentset aside one day every year to rest and praise God for all that He bestows upon mankind. St. Tikhon was even inspired to write special hymns for the day,

and encouraged Orthodox parishes to serve the Divine Liturgy on Thanksgiving, thus sanctifying a secular holiday.

This connection between Thanksgiving Day and the Divine Liturgy is evident when we consider what is the purpose of our worship: to receive the Eucharist. The word comes from the Greek evharistia, meaning "giving thanks." This is primarily because the sacrament is linked to the prayers of thanksgiving recited by the priest before the consecration. But it is also much deeper than that. The Eucharist represents our entire mode of being, how we live in relationship to God.

The Church Fathers teach us that God does not need our praise and thanksgiving. The Trinity is entirely self-sufficient, and needs nothing from His creation. But we humans need to express thanks. It is intrinsic to our nature. When we consider the miracle of our lives, the complexity of our existence and our world, the beauty that surrounds us, it is our natural desire to express gratitude. But to whom may we direct it? Only God is responsible for every good thing we see and experience.

Giving thanks to God does not mean we ignore the brokenness of the world. Christians are also realists. and we should understand that God calls upon us to shine His love and justice into a dark place. But though there is darkness, the light is always brighter; and it is

precisely because of the darkness

that we recognize the light in contrast. So we give thanks in spite of the evil and suffering around us.

If an attitude of constant gratitude does not change God, nor the world around us, what good is it? It changes us. Gratitude turns us toward God. It opens our eyes to blessings we normally overlook. It brings us peace and joy, even in the midst of afflictions. And, as some neuroscientists have found (such as

Jeffrey Schwartz at UCLA), gratitude literally rewires the neural networks in our brains, enabling us to overcome
