
Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

One of the bad habits we modern people are often guilty of is imposing our way of thought on the people of antiquity. We read the Bible and the writings of the saints and interpret the text through a modern lens. But although it may be impossible to understand exactly how the ancients thought or felt, or to fully reconstruct their worldview, there are still precautions we can take to avoid misrepresenting their intent.

An example such a misinterpretation is found in the language of "rights." Today we are obsessed with asserting and defending our personal rights—our freedom to do or say whatever we want, so long as it does not directly hurt another. And we often assume that the ancients were just as concerned with rights as we are. But in fact, if we look at the world through their

eyes, we find that they were more concerned with duties. While it is true that the Greeks, Romans, and other ancient peoples formulated laws to protect property rights and to establish fair trials, their primary focus was on the responsibilities required of each member of society. The main question was not "what are my rights?" but rather, "how do I preserve harmonious relationships with others?"

In the New Testament, we find this way of thinking taken to an extreme. Jesus Christ teaches his disciples to "turn the other cheek" rather than assert and defend their rights. Following the Lord's example, St Paul traverses the Roman Empire and preaches the controversial truth of the Gospel without any concern for his own rights. For this he is often arrested and tortured, even though his civil and legal rights are violated in the process. In fact, the only time he asserts his rights as a Roman citizen is when he appeals for a trial before Caesar: a tool he uses to gain transport to Rome so that he may evangelize (knowing he will likely die as a result of this). Thus the way of the apostles is not one of



In our own time, St Paisios the Agiorite (+1994) addressed our obsession with rights. He tells us that a desire to demand our rights is usually a desire to impose our will on others. In other words, what we consider due to us is always at the expense of another person's free will. Like most of our human shortcomings, it is rooted in selfishness. The

solution, the saint tells us, is to relinquish our rights and entrust ourselves to God. To accomplish this, we must constantly humble ourselves, and ask God to help us overcome the will to power.

Modern society will remain to be consumed with the language of rights; but we Christians must focus on our duty to love and serve God and our fellowman. Such a way transcends all categories of human rights, and leads to true harmony.


