Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross is the first of the "Twelve Great Feasts" in the Church calendar that is dedicated to our Lord Jesus Christ. It commemorates the historical event of the finding of the Cross by St Helen (Elena) in the fourth century, when her entourage excavated Golgotha. After verifying the legitimacy of the Cross by using it to raise a dead man, the Archbishop of Jerusalem raised it on high as the faithful bowed down in

veneration. This is reenacted today in cathedrals when the hierarch blesses the four cardinal directions with a hand-cross, while the people sing "Lord have mercy" one hundred times.

In the hymns for this feast, the Cross is called "the invincible weapon of peace." If this sounds contradictory,

it's because it's meant to. The

Romans used crosses to execute criminals and traitors, those who were not citizens and therefore lacked any rights. To die by crucifixion is a slow, painful process of asphyxiation. And in addition to the physical agony is the mental anguish of being publicly humiliated. Even the Scriptures comment on this, saying, "Cursed is everyone who is hanged on a tree" (Gal 3:13, *paraphrasing* Deut 21:23). A cross, then, represented the most terrifying and shameful way to perish.

In accepting the shame of death-bycrucifixion, Jesus truly entered into solidarity with the lowest place of our human condition. He experienced the pain and torment of the scorned and the broken. And while the thieves to his left and right deserved their punishment, Jesus himself was blameless and pure. They had lived by death, and therefore were subject to death; but Jesus is life itself, and so death could not bind him. What seemed to those watching to be a defeat was changed to victory by the resurrection.

Since the beginning of Christianity, the Cross has been a sign of paradox. A weapon of torture became the means by which our salvation was accomplished. What was meant to inflict suffering

> now brings consolation. What was meant to punish sin becomes the symbol of divine forgiveness.

And so we Christians place the sign of the Cross everywhere—on and in our temples, on our bodies, on objects, and in our rituals. The Cross is a constant reminder of what our Lord Jesus Christ has done for us. But it's also a

reminder of what we ought to do for him as well. We have been called to deny ourselves, pick up our cross each day, and follow him. We are enjoined to love Father, Son, and Holy Spirit more than this earthly life. We are created to live sacrificially, just as Christ sacrificed himself for us.

The Cross is a "scandal to the Jews and folly to the Greeks" (1 Cor 1:23). It is not an empty symbol, but rather the emblem of those who participate in Christ's victory.
